Ariadne's Thread

(Rinaldi,C.(2006) Dialogue with Reggio Emilia, p54-55)

Ariadne's Thread' is a metaphor for the great and fundamental role played by the teacher- by teachers in general and by the teachers in Reggio in particular; a metaphor for the teacher's task of giving orientation, meaning and value to the experience of schools and children (a way out of the 'labyrinth').

Teachers are seen as those who hold the thread, who construct and constitute the interweavings and connections, the web of relationship, to transform them into significant experiences of interaction and communication".

Kirsty Liljegren and Fiona Zinn 'The Courage to Listen Differently'

News from the International Network: Reggio Children

The Reggio Children International Network has held two meetings this year via Zoom; firstly in February and again in June . These virtual meetings make it possible for more Networks to participate, although the time difference from country to country is challenging for many. During the February meeting Claudia Giudici -President of Reggio Children, Cristian Fabbi - President of the Instituzione Infant Toddler and preschools, Nando Rinaldi- Director of the Instituzione, and Lucca Vecchi - Mayor of Reggio Emilia, all spoke sharing the numerous and onerous challenges and responsibilities they face as leaders and citizens coming into 2021. They stressed it was time to move forward, to be creative, to be lateral in thinking and to find new foundations of hope!

Claudia opened the June meeting by reinforcing the importance of working together and the significance of the close relationship that exists between Reggio Children and members of the Network. She stressed their need for the Networks to work in collaboration with Reggio Children to disseminate information and professional learning. She spoke of the impact the global pandemic had on suspending all their plans and the 'stunning, numbing' effect this had on them. Coming from this was a digital ecosystem that gave way to the processes of innovation ie, online activities and possibilities. Claudia stressed one of their objectives was to maintain the quality of the Municipality preschools and infant toddler centres and to continue to hold the values of the educational project as a reference point. Reggio Children must retain its mission, to defend, promote and disseminate the Reggio Emilia Approach - a producer of culture and learning, connected to social transformation.

For wonderful professional learning opportunities visit reggiochildren.org. There are live webinars and other events that you can watch at your convenience on your own or with teaching colleagues. 'Making Learning Visible - children as individual and group learners (2004)' is an excellent book and a great read. Each chapter is written by a different author and coupled with photos that discusses the teaching and learning processes of children and teachers.

Here is a report from Dr Anne Meade who attended the REAIE July '21 Research Symposium

"Landscapes of relationships: Inspiration, exchange and dialogue for the future of childhood"

The online research symposium celebrated the 25-year relationship between Australia and Reggio Emilia. The Keynote Speaker was Claudia Giudici, President of Reggio Children, who first spoke about them trying to imagine new ways "to hold the world together" in the pandemic and about feeling responsible for being a reference point for people "to have a vision for a different way for children's education, to think better for children."

Claudia's keynote was *The right to research in education*. Her address was in two parts:

1. How research is foundational for what adults do in Reggio infant toddler centres and preschools; not in the sense of doing or using academic research to prove something, but rather educators' pedagogy involves researching along with children's research.

2.Sharing insights from joint research by Reggio Children and the University of Modena, where she is a professor. Their premise: children work with visual and oral metaphors in constructing knowledge. They found that children often see humour in creating metaphors; they're multiplying knowledges; and they choose metaphors to get others to listen to them, e.g., "Look, the tree hairdressers have come!" (An arborist had arrived to trim the trees.)

I loved the way the Symposium breakout 'rooms' were true to the three themes: •*Inspiration* (drawing inspiration and insights from Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders);

Exchange (drew inspiration from Malaguzzi's words that "learning and teaching should not stand on opposite banks ...but should embark together through active, reciprocal exchange". Our Australian visitors to NZ, Stefania Giamminuti, on ateliers, and Chris Celada and Margo Hobba, on material experiences, were some of the presenters;

Dialogue (shaped by Paola Cagliari's words, "As educators, our role is to see dialogue not only as an exchange but a process of transformation"). Sessions focused on infants and toddlers, a parent's perspective and a primary school's research.

Symposium registrants had six weeks to view 'room' sessions on-line. The creative approaches taken by presenters was engaging – visuals were foregrounded, and 'talking heads' and text slides were the exception, resulting in memorable professional learning. Congratulations REAIE.

In this segment we spotlight one of our Regional Networks


REANZ South
