
Clear away the undergrowth so the new shoots of the harakeke can spring up

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An Encounter with Tiziana Filippini. Pedagogista from Reggio Emilia

The Trustees recently met for professional development and planning for the 2024 year

In Reggio Emilia ECE settings, the school year begins in September with the team of pedagogistas sharing an intent to a meeting of representatives from the centres in the city. The intent has been created through a review of the past year, observations and conversations amongst pedagogistas and educators. The intent is discussed and shaped further from September to December through collaborative work of pedagogistas and centres. By December, a plan for the progettazione has been designed. It is put into a loose-leaf folder that allows for changes as centre educators reflect on and revise their plan month on month, with guidance from pedagogistas and atelieristas.

Tiziana Filippini shared an example from Allende Preschool of their design/plan. They planned to use:

- the atelier of nature, as the 'red thread' was what nature means to children,
- music and dance as the two 'languages' of children to be enhanced (under-used in the past),
- the key 'word' central to their narration: human figures,
- 'resonances' between dance and music and nature afforded by listening to music, experiencing musical instruments, experiencing dance and music.

When we asked about the length of this project, Tiziana said it took three years, partly because there had been little music and dance prior; also, it was harder to document performative(ephemeral) processes of learning. The project needed to start with analyses of existing knowledge of the participating teachers and leaders (minimal) and then spend time growing their knowledge and experience with these 'languages'. Tiziana talked about her own (minimal) knowledge of dance, saying she didn't know it as a 'language', she didn't have an existing lens or framework to look inside experiences of dancing.

Experts of dance and music were introduced to the teachers, and they participated in dance studio experiences. Children observed dancers and musicians who came into the centres and shared their instruments and music with the children. It was important for the Reggio teachers to be the ones who worked with the children and grow their capabilities in the languages of music and dance, if there was to be a lasting impact.

As the progettazione progressed and was documented, the teachers shared it with their pedagogista and with colleagues elsewhere. Sharing is critical for professional development. After three years centres had completed that project; all key documentation was brought to the Loris Malaguzzi International Centre to develop an exhibition. Its curation provided further professional learning through them articulating the intentions in teaching processes and interpreting the learning. The exhibition of their translated work allowed others to share in and learn from Allende Preschool.

At this point, Tiziana explained that it is like having many components of a puzzle and, in the final stage of the project, the puzzle comes together. A pedagogista's role across the months/years is to view the teachers' and children's work with curiosity, not with judgement. The main goal is for teachers as well as children to learn and grow from the complex learning and research experiences, especially those relating to the 'red thread' at the heart of the design.

Thank you Tiziana for this rich experience where we were able to take a closer look at the process of the formulations of research and professional development within the preschools and infant-toddler centres.
